

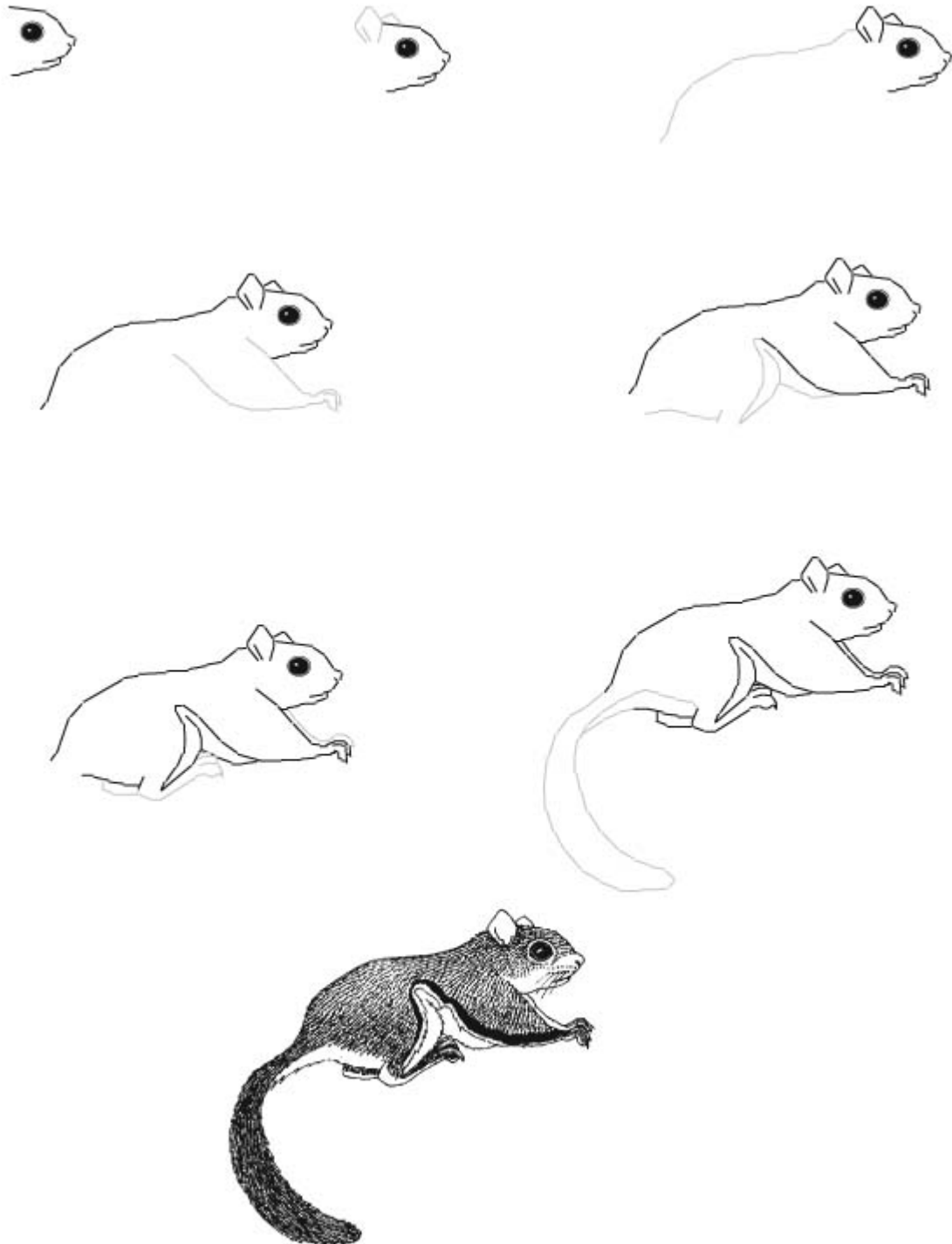

CITING RESEARCH REFERENCES

When you research information you must cite the reference. Citing for websites is different from books and periodicals. The style of citing shown here is from the MLA Style Citations (Modern Language Association).

When citing a **WEBSITE** the general format is as follows.

Author Last Name, First Name(s). "Title: Subtitle of Part of Web Page, if appropriate." Title:

appropriate. Sponsoring/Publishing Agency, If Given. Additional significant descriptive inform or other Date, such as Last Updated. Day Month Year of access <URL>.

Here is an example of citing this page:
